The international travelling exhibition "Anne Frank – a history for today"



The exhibition tells the story of Anne Frank against the background of the persecution of the Jews during the second world war. The appalling consequences of the Holocaust are the backdrop to the story of a single young girl. The exhibition aims to inform visitors about the history of the Holocaust and to show that differences between people in every society may be exploited to generate intolerance, denial of equal treatment, discrimination, exclusion and even mass murder. To prevent this it is necessary for all to realise that differences between people must be respected and valued. The exhibition challenges visitors to think about the concepts of tolerance, mutual respect and human rights.
