What is Self Assessment?

- Self assessment is a continuous process that evaluates performance and enables continuous improvement
- Learner outcomes are at the heart of self assessment
- In governance it addresses the performance of both the college and the board (individually and collectively)

Why have Self Assessment?

- to improve Board and College performance in meeting the needs of learners
- to demonstrate value for use of public funds
- to lessen the need for expensive and bureaucratic external regulation and intervention
- to meet, amongst others, the requirements of the Common Inspection Framework, the Framework for Excellence

*How should Governors carry out Self Assessment?

- Individually and collectively
- By using an agreed framework e.g. the Common Inspection Framework and/or the Framework for Excellence
- Through use of questionnaires and responses to external reports
- By discussion and evaluation continuously and at away days
- By peer reference
- By applying the 7 standards of public life
- Rigorously and evidence-based
- Supported by an explicit Quality Improvement Plan

What is the role of the Staff Governor in Self Assessment?

- As a representative of staff
- As someone who is directly involved in the day to day activities of the college and contact with the learner
- As a source of additional evidence and advice to fellow governors
- As an individual and accountable governor in her/his own right

Key Attributes of effective Governance

- Being a critical friend
- Being rigorously self critical
- Being committed to open and honest performance appraisal and continuous improvement
- Communicating with staff, students, governors and stakeholders
- Staying informed and up to date
- Committing to training and continuous professional development
