#### **1. Trade Union Climate Change Conference** Saturday 9 February 2008 University of London Union, Malet Street, London

Climate change has become a major, mainstream issue for trade unions. UCU is supporting the national Trade Union Climate Change conference in London and branches and LAs are strongly encouraged to draw members' attention to it and are invited to send delegates to the conference. ## 2. UUK report: Greening Spires: Universities & the green agenda

This report contains many impressive examples of the contribution which university research is making to measures to reduce energy and materials use and contribute to sustainability. But the references are overwhelmingly towards the contribution of science, and little is made of the role which economics, transport planning, law, politics, social policy and other subjects will have to play in promoting sustainable options.

There is also little mention of the role which university unions and students can play to create changes in opinion and behaviour from below.

The report highlights many courses with environmental elements, but there is no mention of the need to build sustainability into the whole HE curriculum. The excellent work on this at Gloucester University looks sadly untypical.

UCU welcomed the report but also mentioned the economic and public policy teaching and research done by UK academics and the role university unions and student unions can play. We repeated our call for universities to establish local partnerships to develop plans to green campuses and the curriculum.

## 3. Tackling climate change – Sir David King

Sir David King, the former Government Chief Scientific Adviser, drew attention to the some of the issues absent in the UUK report with a plea for an interdisciplinary approach to tackling climate change. In a statement to the new 'Times Higher Education' (the former THES), Sir David challenged academics in the arts, humanities and social sciences for staying in their disciplinary "comfort zones" and failing to engage with scientists on the problem of climate change..

#### 4. News of HEFCE's response to climate change

On 31 January, HEFCE publishes its 'Strategic review of sustainable development in Higher Education in England'. The report exposes the patchy and generally poor progress which Heist are making to incorporate sustainable development (SD) into their activities. HEFCE consulted on progress being made to promote (SD) via estates and management, research and teaching. An apparently unasked question was 'what are you doing to involve staff, including their unions, and students?' The report's brief as well as its responses show how little attempt has so far been made to develop an inclusive campus culture of sustainability by developing strategies with staff and student representatives. This is where UCU must play a role. Only 22 estates departments of the 132 institutions bothered to even reply.

There is slow progress on SD in teaching and research, and the level of interest shown by HEIs and departments varies enormously, illustrating the challenge ahead. Some fine examples of SD in teaching exist and UCU is keen to encourage the spread of this good practise. There is concern however that progress will be slow because of barriers to adopting SD, e.g. RAE funding obstacles to multidisciplinary work - as well as the attitudes of some academics to involving themselves in SD.

UCU intends to encourage involvement in SD with sensitivity. This is a pressing global priority and further and higher education will have a vital role to play. Please send us your comments on how we can speed up the greening of the curriculum as well as the campus.

Higher education institutions (HEIs) in England will benefit from a new fund to provide repayable grants for projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The fund will total £30-40 million to distribute over the three years from 2008. Read more at www.hefce.ac.uk/news/hefce/2008/green.htm.

#### 5. Go Green Week

#### 16-24 February with 'People and Planet' and how green is your university?

UCU staff recently met with People and Planet, the student campaign on world poverty, human rights and the environment, to explore possible cooperation in universities and colleges. In June 2007, People & Planet published the first ever league table of universities' environmental performance – **The Green League**. The report shocked many VCs into action. Many are fearful of a poor reputation on an issue of such importance to young people who may be university applicants.



Whatever the merits of league tables, UCU wants the response of HEIs to be more than a public relations campaign. There is a need for discussions with campus unions and student representatives to develop strategies to green universities.

Look out for P&P's 'Go Green Week' 16-24 February. This will be the UK's first national student week of action and events against climate chaos. Groups will be organising loads of different events across the whole of the country at universities, colleges and schools.
