TIME OFF FOR UNION DUTIES

THE NEW VERSION of the ACAS Code of Practice on time off for trade union duties and activities came into force on 1 January 2010. Revised after substantial consultation to reflect the changing nature of the British workplace, the new code of practice includes improved arrangements on:

- a) cover
- b) facilities such as use of email andc) learning agreements/union learningrep rights.

Encourage your branch to have a look at your own facilities, recognition agreements and learning locally to ensure that they are at least as strong as the new code. If not, this could be a good opportunity to renegotiate with your employer.

Lights, Camera, Action!

THIS SUMMER STOCKPORT Trade Union Education will launch an exciting new course for reps in the North West. Based on the popular Unionlearn course previously only offered to full-time union officers, *Lights, Camera, Action!* has been extended and rewritten to give union reps the skills needed to make professional-looking videos and take advantage of the campaigning opportunities offered by new media.

Taught by experienced TU tutor John Handley (a Granada TV news cameraman in a previous life) this intensive three-day course is accredited through the Open College Network. The course is designed to enable union reps to consider the use of new types of media to engage with members and a wider audience, and will cover the following:

- how to use new media to promote the union, inform and communicate with members
- why it is important for trade unions to make use of the opportunities presented by new media
- a practical introduction to film and video techniques including editing of footage
- planning a shoot from storyboard to location.

The course is suitable for complete novices and those with experience of using new media.

If you would like to attend, you will need to seek approval from your UCU branch and your regional

ONE YEAR AGO UCU carried out a survey of members new to tertiary education to find out more about the unique challenges they face in their careers and to identify how the union could support them better. This was the first time that the union had conducted a survey of this kind. Over nine hundred members replied – the biggest response to any UCU survey.

One message that came over loud and clear was that these members wanted training and support, and the opportunity to meet and network with other members.

In answer to this, Monday 22 March saw the debut of UCU's new course *Managing student behaviour from the start*. The course examined the key causes of challenging and antisocial behaviour in the classroom, and looked at different strategies that members could employ to manage difficult behaviour.

'I wanted to come on to this training as I only started teaching in September and felt ill equipped in managing difficult behaviour. The day has been brilliant in helping me build confidence and think of strategies that I will be able to implement in the classroom,' said Regine Pilling of Westminster Kingsway College.

Katie Buckingham from Croydon College agreed, 'Like Regine, I am fairly new to teaching and wanted to have some training on managing behaviour that would make me more effective and enable me to get the best out of my learners.

'I found the course really valuable, and through sharing experiences with teachers from other colleges I am reassured to discover that I am not alone in my experiences with difficult learners.'

Feedback after the course was overwhelmingly positive. Participants thought it was a great first step from the union in meeting their needs. Stephanie Herlock from Harlow College said, 'I would not hesitate to recommend this fun, interactive and enjoyable course to all new teachers. The guidance I have received has been invaluable.'

NEW COURSES AND RESOURCES FOR EARLY-CAREERS MEMBERS

No need to shout! 12 May 2010, London: A one-day interactive

workshop which gives practical advice on how to:

- boost vocal capability and clarity in the learning environment
- use the voice in a positive, calm and assertive manner to manage student behaviour
- implement techniques to safeguard vocal health
- use a language of choice not power.

Assertiveness Day

13 May, London: A one-day course

aimed at members who want to develop their understanding of what constitutes effective communication and behaviour. By the end of the course, participants will be able to:

- identify why individuals have difficulty communicating in a one-to-one situation or to groups
- understand the impact of different types of behaviour
- have a greater understanding of what makes an effective communicator
- develop an action plan identifying areas for personal improvement in the future.



Love Music Hate Racism Using music to

promote diversity in education, September 2010 (date tbc) The course aims are to empower participants to develop practical approaches to promoting diversity in their workplaces both in their teachings and via their union branch. The key themes are:

- challenging stereotypes
- recognising influential figures in the fight for equality
- how to use music to get your message out
- developing anti-sexist, anti-racist campaigns
- enhancing your professional teaching with students
- organising local events, training and briefings to promote diversity.

The accredited course will be run on a region by region basis over two days and will involve a follow-up event to be organised by each participant as part of the course. Participants will be encouraged to work together within their regions as well as with other local organisations.
