1. UCU Climate Solidarity Conference Report

The conference, held on 25 November 2009 at Carlow Street, was a great opportunity to discuss some of the work we have been engaged in during 2009. Thanks to all the participants for making it a success.

The outcomes were reported to the UCU National Executive on Nov. 27th and a plan of work outlined for 2010.

2. Climate Action Groups

Examples of CAG activity so far include:

Sheffield College – 2 delegates to the UCU conference set up their first meeting in December, 2009. It was agreed to focus on 2 projects:

- paper recycling
- monitoring travel to work with a view to promoting car sharing and cycling

As well as individual changes to behaviour the group also agreed to contact senior management to:

- inform them of staff representation on the new Environmental Working Group
- request affiliation to the 10:10 campaign
- offer to run a training event.

South Thames College – 50 staff have expressed an interest in participating in Climate Action Groups following all staff emails, staff development days, and union meetings. Action Group meetings have been arranged on the 3 main college sites for the end of January.

We need you to send in other examples so that we can publicise them in this newsletter and on the UCU and COIN websites. No one is saying setting up CAGs will be easy but equally it may not be as daunting as some people think. Have a look at the Action Group Pack Introductory Materials on the COIN site for advice

3. Education for Sustainable Development

UCU launched a 'Greening the curriculum' campaign in the weeks leading up to the Copenhagen Climate summit in December. Lecturers in both sectors ran sessions on sustainability. Some of these materials are available on the UCU site http://www.ucu.org.uk/index.cfm?articleid=4373. UCU don't see this as a one-off activity so we have set up an Education for Sustainable Development Working group. There are a number of developments taking place across the sectors on this.



Further education - The LSC has funded a series of workshops that are free to staff in FE. They will take place on:

- Feb 2nd London
 Feb. 3rd Stourbridge (near Birmingham)
 Feb. 4th York
- Higher education UCU will be liaising with the Higher Education Academy to promote developments and look at best practice.

Contact **Graham Petersen** for further information if you are interested in any of the above. We will be arranging a fringe meeting at Annual Congress on this subject and it will be a priority area of work for us in 2010.

4. Environment/Green Representatives

UCU continue to press for statutory recognition. In the absence of any legal rights the new ACAS Guidance is worth noting. The relevant extract is:

The role of environmental representatives and their needs

In some workplaces trade unions gain agreement from the employer to elect or appoint representatives with a specialist role. Environmental representatives focus on the climate change agenda and changes in work organisation and green workplace projects. They may serve on environmental committees if these are established. They can work to improve the impact of an organisation or workplace on the local environment, helping nearby communities and raising the reputation of the employer. Environmental representatives have no statutory rights to time off, training or facilities. Appropriate training is available from trade unions and the TUC and the government sponsored Union Learning Fund is available to support approved training programmes for these.

5. Copenhagen – what next?

The outcome of the summit was a major disappointment even though there were plenty of signs early on that it would not deliver what was needed. This means campaigning must be stepped up this year in the lead-up to Mexico in November. UCU were present on the Wave demonstrations in December (http://www.ucu.org.uk/index.cfm?articleid=4372) and we need to build on this in the coming months.



6. UCU FE Regional Briefings

During February and March we will be 'on tour' to update branch and regional officials on our environment work. We need every branch to identify at least one person who can be a point of contact for promoting the union's green agenda. Further details will be in branch mailings.

7. Conferences
