4. EI Global Awareness Raising Campaign PAY EQUITY NOW!

On International Women's Day 2010 Education International launched its Global Campaign "Pay Equity Now". By launching this campaign, EI affirms the right of all workers to equitable wages, and aims to help education unions overcome gender discrimination in employment.

The EI Pay Equity Now Campaign aims to encourage teacher organizations worldwide to collect solid evidence, adopt union policies, and network for well-coordinated lobbying to get governments to commit to implementing pay equity, also in times of economic crisis.

Pay equity means:

- > Equal pay for the same work
- > Equal pay for work of comparable value
- Eliminating the wage gap between female- and male-dominated jobs
- > Taking factors such as ethnicity, social background and disability into consideration

We are inviting you to share with us the posters and pictures of your activities and campaigns for equal pay, as well as your stories from negotiations and lobbying successes.

As you may know, the Equal Pay Day will be celebrated again this year in spring. The date differs between countries, and symbolizes how far into 2010 women must work to earn what men earned in 2009. In the pan-European region we will take the European Pay Equity Day on 15 April 2010 as an occasion for a European launch of the campaign. 5. Local news: Goldsmiths against points based immigration

Des Freedman – Secretary UCU Goldsmiths reports:

'Students Not Suspects' is a group of staff and students, based at Goldsmiths and officially supported by Goldsmiths UCU and NUS, opposed to the points-based immigration rules (PBI). We've been campaigning on the issue for some time and held a public meeting in February with Tony Benn, Sean Vernell, the NUS Black Students' Officer and the campaigns manager from English PEN.

It was a fantastic meeting. Our starting point is that the rules are explicitly discriminatory and divisive at a time when we want maximum unity to resist the impending cuts. The spectre of the cuts was the major backdrop to the meeting. This is not a diversion from 'bread and butter' issues but a way of bringing staff and students together on an issue of major concern.

So far apart from producing some great campaign T-shirts ('We are not border agents' is the slogan - see them at http://homepages.gold.ac.uk/ucu/):

- Four academic departments at Goldsmiths have signed a statement of opposition to PBI rules;
- We've collected personal stories and experiences about how PBI has impacted on students' lives and have got the Students Union to represent people who've been negatively affected;
- > We're organising a teach-in on the 18th of March on the issue;
- We've taken the issue to the JNCC asking management to make a public statement on PBI and have asked for an impact assessment on the implementation of the rules;
- > We've given out thousands of postcards and flyers with information about PBI;
- We've now held two really successful public meetings at the College and have a Facebook page ('Students Not Suspects' as well as a blog).

Campaigns like this involve new faces and really help to build bridges between staff and students at a time when this unity is essential.
